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#### Welcome to the YAYAs



he year 2020 marks an important milestone for QED Foundation. It is now 30 years since we set out to help people of every race and faith to fulfil their potential and we are delighted to have been able to celebrate this anniversary with the YAYA 2020 Awards, in association with York St John University.

The Yorkshire Asian Young Achievers awards (The YAYAs) is the first scheme of its kind set up to recognise the efforts of young people aged 16-30, of South Asian heritage born or living and working in Yorkshire. Its special focus is on those socially-mobile young achievers who have overcome deprivation and disadvantage, or have broken through traditional barriers to progress.

The awards aim to: promote social mobility among young South Asians; identify role models to help inspire others from the relevant communities; encourage young South Asians to seek out and take up further and higher education opportunities

I set up QED in 1990 with the vision of supporting people from ethnic minority backgrounds to play a full role in all areas of public life. From the outset, I decided we should remain a small, enabling charity that would bring about big changes by helping mainstream organisations to break down the barriers facing ethnic minority communities.

Fortunately they have made great progress over the last three decades. They are now represented in all sectors of society and at every level, including the Cabinet. This is mainly due to three things:

Firstly, changes to UK equality legislation have made it more difficult to discriminate against people on the basis of their faith or ethnicity. Secondly, there has been increasing recognition that a diverse population offers social and economic benefits. And, thirdly, a growing number of progressive leaders have campaigned hard for equality and social justice.

But recent events – from the coronavirus pandemic to the killing of George Floyd - have shown that much still

needs to be done to root out the institutional racism that afflicts Western societies.

So our vision remains the same today. We will continue to run a wide range of training and development activities to help us achieve our objectives. These include English language courses, essential to the successful integration of new arrivals and refugees. We will launch new initiatives to help people from ethnic minority backgrounds to follow a wider choice of career paths, find jobs, set up businesses or go on to further or higher education.

For 30 years we have been active nationally and internationally and directly helped 35,000 people to increase their knowledge, confidence and skills so that they can succeed in every area of life. But we will also continue to connect public and private sector leaders to community influencers throughout the country.

Developing a deeper understanding of the UK's many ethnic minority groups helps them to recruit, retain and develop a diverse workforce and customer base.

We have supported around 1,000 managers and policy makers in this way. This work has indirectly enabled us to help many thousands more people from ethnic minority backgrounds to progress their careers in all sectors of the economy.

I would like to thank numerous people who have supported and encouraged QED over the past 30

years, including our trustees, staff, associates, volunteers, funders and community partners too many to mention by name.

However, I must make a special mention of one colleague. She joined QED in 1992 and has remained shoulder to shoulder with me since then - our deputy chief executive, Adeeba Malik

#### THE LORD BICHARD KCB. NON-EXECUTIVE CHAIRMAN. NATIONAL AUDIT OFFICE

Michael Bichard worked at senior levels in local government and was chief executive at both Brent and Gloucestershire. He moved into central government working as chief executive of the Benefits Agency and then as permanent secretary at the Department for Education and Employment. Since his retirement from the civil service in 2001, he has held a variety of positions including vice chancellor of the University of the Arts London, chair of the Legal Services Commission, founder director of the Institute for Government, chair of Shakespeare's Globe, chair of the Design Council and has recently retired as chair of the Social Care Institute for Excellence. He also chaired an inquiry into the Soham murders in 2004. Michael is currently chair of Bristol Business School advisory board, non-executive director of The Key (an education support company), and trustee of the River & Rowing Museum. Knighted in 1999, he became a cross-bench member of the Lords in 2010 and was for five years a deputy speaker of the House.

#### PROFESSOR KAREN BRYAN OBE, VICE-CHANCELLOR, YORK ST JOHN UNIVERSITY

Professor Karen Bryan joined York St John University as Vice Chancellor in April 2020. She was previously Deputy V-C (Academic) at the University of Greenwich. Prior to that she was Pro Vice Chancellor for Regional Engagement and Dean of the Faculty of Health and Wellbeing at Sheffield Hallam University. Professor Bryan qualified as a speech and language therapist from the University of Newcastle upon Tyne and also gained her PhD there. Her research interests are in communication difficulties in young offenders and in forensic populations, also the impact of communication difficulties on access to healthcare. She is involved in the development of Registered Intermediaries working for the Ministry of Justice, and was previously a member of the Health Professions Council. Professor Bryan is a Visiting Professor in the Department of Neuropsychology at the University of Warsaw, and is a Fellow of the Royal College of Speech and Language Therapists. She was awarded an OBE for services to higher education in 2018.

Dr Mohammed Ali OBE is Founder and CEO of the OED Foundation. He has worked in ethnic minority community development for over 35 years, in the UK and Europe. He is a social entrepreneur, pioneering and developing new ways of addressing the social and economic challenges facing ethnic minority communities. He worked with Glaxo Pharmaceuticals, Bradford Community Relations Council, Tameside Council, Sheffield City Council and Fullemploy, a Londonbased ethnic minority social and economic development agency, before setting up QED in 1990. He has served on numerous public, private and voluntary sector boards and committees, including for the NHS, Home Office, DWP, IOD, EU, ACEVO, Bradford University and York St John University. He is chair of the Poverty Alleviation Scholarships Foundation and the Network of Pakistani Voluntary Organisations (ÚK). He has won many accolades for his work including an honorary doctorate from the University of Bradford in 1997 and the OBE in 2001.

Noreen is also a stand-up



Safiyyah is a 19-year-old Pakistani boxer from Bradford. She wears a hijab while fighting and hopes to compete at the Olympics one day. After overcoming long term illness and an eating disorder, Safiyyah aims to break the stereotypes in her male-dominated sport. She is featured in BBC's We Are Bradford project, explaining that despite being told 'you're a hijab girl, you can't box', she is more determined than ever.

#### **AWARD SPONSOR**

The story of Kashmir Crown Bakeries is one of passion, ambition, hard work, strength of relationships and community.

KCB was one of the first Asian bakeries in the UK. From its base in Bradford, West Yorkshire, it has grown into an international brand with a multi-million-pound



turnover and is the biggest business of its kind in Western Europe.

Its success is due in large part to the determination and ambition of Mohammed Saleem, a man from a humble background who had "high aspirations." At the age of 20, he arrived in the UK, in 1961, with only £5 in his pocket. Holding on to the dream to have his own business and with an investment of £55, he opened Kashmir Food Store, in Bradford.

His idea was to provide a connection with the homeland for the community in Bradford. For people from Pakistan, India, Bangladesh – mainly from the Indian subcontinent – Asian sweets were difficult to find in the late 1960s, especially for important festivals such as Eid and Diwali.

"Mohammed Saleem had a passion to provide what the people of his culture really wanted," says Asim Saleem, the eldest of Mohammed's six children, who is now the Managing Director of



Kashmir Crown Bakeries.

Kashmir Crown Bakeries now distributes to more than 2,000 independent retailers in the UK and has a licensed distributor in the US.

KCB is based on passion, ambition and hard work but, more than that, its story is about the strength of growing relationships and community. Whether it is the community of customers or the network of suppliers, Kashmir Crown Bakeries has a philosophy of shared values and collaboration that is still its greatest strength.

Haleema Rafiq, aged 27 from Doncaster is of Pakistani background. She was first in her family to get two degrees in Psychology and has done both paid and voluntary work in the mental health sector. During her studies, Haleema sadly lost her mother and became a carer for her two brothers – one of which has cerebral palsy. Despite this, Haleema finished her degree and continues to work helping ill patients.



#### SARAH KHAN

At 29, Sarah Khan, from Bradford, is completing her PhD while working as a Senior Lecturer in Pharmacy at Huddersfield University. Of Pakistani heritage, she attended an all-girls Muslim college and graduated with a first-class degree - paving the way for more family members to attend University after her. She headed the 'Rise Up To Cancer' campaign, encouraging Asian women to go for screenings.



This year we will be exploring sound in two exhibitions – the first, opening in April, explores the technology that makes cultural life sound incredible; from shaping works by international music artists to inspiring the BBC Radiophonic Workshop (which




created the Doctor Who soundtrack among many others). It will be complemented by an interactive family show opening in July, and visitors of all ages can get their hands on unique interactive displays which explore the science and sensations of sound.

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

Born in Batley, of Pakistani heritage, Haris Rashid became the first south Asian president at Liverpool Hope University's Student Union. His low social economic background hasn't stopped him achieving his Bronze and Silver Duke of Edinburgh awards, studying law or taking part in the National Citizen Service. Haris, 21, also worked with the late Jo Cox MP and volunteers for the night-line service at his University.



**NAVID HUSSAIN** 

Dr Navid Hussain, 26, was brought up by his single mother in Bradford. He is of Pakistani background and grew up in an area with low education and high unemployment. Navid received the Ford Blue Oval Scholarship, allowing him to achieve a First-Class BEng degree at Bradford University and complete his PhD in Leeds. Since, Dr Hussain has contributed to the advancement of scientific research in Hungary and the US.

While at Cockburn School, Shammin was a member of the Youth Parliament for Leeds and in 2019, was part of the young Muslim leadership programme at Oxford University. He is of Bangladeshi background, lives in Leeds and is a board governor at his former school.



**AASIM KHAN** 

Now 28, Aasim Khan, who is of Pakistani heritage, was raised in a deprived area of Sheffield. He has since dedicated his life to helping others and raised over £300,000 for refugee camps. Aasim founded Darnall Football Academy to provide young people with a safe place to socialise. Currently, 500 young people are registered there and competing in leagues. In his spare time, Aasim also writes poetry about Islamophobia.



SHUMMEL UDDIN

Shummel is an advocate for Asian participation in football. He has developed partnerships with Kick it Out and Bradford FC Sporting Equals in the hope to reduce anti-social behaviour and crime within the BD3 area. Shummel, 28, arranges football tournaments to raise money for charity and manages the Bengal Tigers U12 football team. He also develops potential Asian players for Bradford City football club. Shummel is of Bengali heritage.

Frakhanda Shah, 24, has broken barriers in software engineering, an industry in which women are under-represented. Earlier, she worked as a Software Developer for Sky after graduating with a BEng in Software Engineering. In March 2020, she became a Scrum Master for Provident Financial and now manages multiple development teams. Of Pakistani background, she encourages young BAME women to pursue STEM careers.



**AMREEN IQBAL** 

Amreen Iqbal is a Police Constable for West Yorkshire Police. For seven years, she worked as a special constable, and is trained to deal with sexual assaults, rapes and riots on the front line. Amreen, 30, was recently awarded employee of the month for her investigative work. She is one of the very few Asian female police officers in the country. She is of Pakistani background and based in Bradford.



SAMERA SHABIR

Samera Shabir, of Keighley, was elected as the first Asian Student Affairs Officer for her University. She was previously student president, representing 9,000 students to local community leaders and the NUS. The last female elected for the role was 10 years ago and despite this achievement, Samera, 22, had to convince her Bengali family to let her take the role. Now she leads campaigns against harassment and student safety.

Of Pakistani heritage, he is now training for Ben Nevis. He also works with Bradford University to help them engage disabled students.



**HANIFA RASHID**

## YORKSHIRE ASIAN YOUNG ACHIEVER OF THE YEAR 2020 WINNER



#### Mohammed Ali Hussain

Mohammed Ali Hussain's story is so remarkable and spans so many areas of achievement that the judges decided to place him a category of his own for the YAYAS Young Achiever of the Year Award 2020.

They had originally intended to choose an overall Young Achiever from among the winners of the 12 award categories but unanimously decided that Mohammed, aged 20, stood out from all other entrants in this year's shortlist.

Of Pakistani heritage, Mohammed overcame a very difficult childhood and chaotic home life to become a mentor, support and champion for the voices of children and young people in care. He entered care himself at just 18 months old because of alcohol and domestic abuse issues in his family; he was moved to a number of foster placements, each of which broke down, until he was eventually placed in one family at age 10 for nearly a year.

He was then moved to a children's home where he suffered from bullying – both there and at school  and struggled to find the peace and space to study before finally discovering the solace he needed in libraries, where he used to go to learn on his own.

At 16, he began to live more independently and moved into a semi-independent household and, by the time he was 17, he was living entirely independently while studying for his exams. He achieved 11 GCSEs and three A-Levels and he is now studying Physics with Astro-Physics at the University of Hull and plans to go on to study for a PhD. He hopes to stay in academia and go on to become a university professor.

Mohammed, who lives in Hull, has been chair of Bradford Children in Care Council (CICC), representing all young people in care and care leavers in Bradford Council.

As chair, he has spearheaded many changes for looked-after and leaving care children from the installation of wi-fi in Bradford's residential homes to campaigns around young people's rights. He has delivered training to all new foster carers in



Bradford, training that has now been incorporated into the instruction that all new foster carers complete before they enter the Bradford fostering service.

He has also delivered training to students and social workers. He has challenged on behalf of Bradford's care population and is now a member of the young people's panel interviewing perspective employees, from directors to residential workers.
