



e are thrilled to present the third Yorkshire Asian Young Achievers (YAYAs) awards on Friday, November 11, 2022, at the Cedar Court Hotel, in Bradford.

Back in 2020, when I decided to hold the first event to mark the 30th anniversary of our charity, I had no idea just how popular this celebration of youthful talent would be.

Things did not look good when our plans for a gala awards presentation were derailed by the pandemic but a live broadcast streamed on the internet enabled us to reach out to an even wider audience than we had originally envisaged.

Fortunately, last year we were able to bring some of the region's most gifted and successful young people together with an audience of hundreds, as originally planned, and 2022 sees us set to enjoy the best of both worlds. As well as the buzz and excitement of meeting face to face, there will be a live webcast for those who cannot be there in person.

QED Foundation works hard to make sure that people of all ethnic backgrounds have the same opportunities to fulfil their potential.

Whilst delivering training and employment support programmes across Yorkshire, we regularly meet young South Asians who

have succeeded at the highest level - often against the odds.

The YAYAs enable us to showcase their achievements to a wider audience and show others what is possible with determination, hard work and self-belief.

The awards are open to young people aged 16-30 born or living in the county, with a focus on those who have overcome deprivation or disadvantage or broken through traditional barriers to progress.

We hope these outstanding role models will inspire others to follow in their footsteps and seek out further and higher education opportunities.

Of course, none of this would have been possible without the generosity of our sponsors, some of which have supported us from the outset.

I am sure that you will be inspired and uplifted by the stories brought to you at this year's event.


And I hope that it encourages more young South Asians to set their sights high and achieve the same levels of success.

About QED



Transforming lives since 1990

ED Foundation is like a chemical catalyst, changing the lives of hundreds of thousands of people for the better while remaining unaltered itself. Thirty-two years after we were founded in a terraced house in Manningham, we are still based in the city and are proud to host prestigious events like the YAYA awards here.

We have stayed true to our northern roots and our education, training, employment-related and health services support disadvantaged communities throughout Yorkshire. But they also inform our campaigning and influencing work, helping to improve the lives of millions more people across the UK.

Yet we have always moved with the times and adapted to new challenges. In the early days we focused mainly on helping people from disadvantaged communities who were struggling to find work against a background of high local unemployment levels, low educational attainment and the collapse of traditional industries. More recently, the social and health inequalities laid bare by the Covid-19 pandemic have presented very different scenarios for us to respond to.

So we now have three priorities. Firstly, under-employment is becoming as much of an issue as unemployment. Students from some ethnic minority groups backgrounds are less likely to go on to land top jobs than their white counterparts, so we encourage and support employers to make sure that their

workforces reflect local demographics at all levels of seniority.

But we also celebrate success and encourage young people to believe that they can achieve great things, even if it is against the odds. Events like the YAYAs are a great way of showcasing outstanding achievement. We know how difficult it is for young people to aim high if they cannot see others from their communities who have overcome obstacles and fulfilled their dreams. We hope the YAYAs will prove to them that where there is a will, there is a way.

Secondly, we are focusing our efforts on improving the prospects of the most disadvantaged ethnic minority groups - like Pakistani and Bangladeshi communities, which often struggle to break out of a vicious circle of unemployment or dead-end jobs, poverty, substandard housing, poor health and low educational attainment.

And, finally, we are helping to build bridges between diaspora communities in Britain and their countries of origin so that we can encourage trade and collaboration between the UK and international partners like India, Pakistan and Bangladesh.

Times have changed but our commitment to helping create a fairer and more equal society remains the same. When we began in 1990, there were just 3.5 million people from ethnic minority backgrounds in the UK. In 2019, the Office for National Statistics estimated that more than 15% of the population is not white.

The last three decades have seen these communities make

Opening opportunities to all

■ great strides forward in all areas of public life. In 1990 all but four of our MPs were white - yet Rishi Sunak has just narrowly missed becoming Britain's first South Asian Prime Minister. Holders of high-profile ministerial appointments are from increasingly diverse backgrounds, and Sajid Javid has held two of the four great Offices of State, becoming Home Secretary in 2018 and Chancellor in 2019. Sadiq Khan has been Mayor of London since 2016.

Mishal Hussain and Faisal Islam break the news. Yasmin Alibhai-Brown and Jim Al-Khalili make us think; Romesh Ranganathan and Shazia Mirza make us laugh; and Boohoo CEO Muhmud Kamani and discount giant B&M's Arora brothers have made their fortunes. Everywhere we look, people from minority ethnic backgrounds - including British South Asians - are making their mark.

But success does not always come easy. As society becomes increasingly unequal, QED Foundation's mission to help everyone fulfil his or her potential becomes more important than ever. For us, no-one is a number. We take our time to get to know each of our service users and design a customised package of support that meets his or her individual needs. For those who are long-term unemployed, we offer much more than help with looking for vacancies, writing CVs, filling in application forms and learning and practising interview techniques.

We specialise in giving people farthest from the labour market the self-confidence to take those difficult first steps, match trainees to suitable work placements and provide ongoing support to the companies that take them on. Inability to communicate effectively is the most difficult barrier preventing successful integration into British life for recent migrants and isolated members of settled communities alike. Our English courses help new arrivals and refugees to develop speaking, listening, reading and writing skills - but they are also supported to use public services and become more involved in wider society.

Our small classes are led by professional teachers in a relaxed and friendly environment. Our students receive individual Information, Advice and Guidance and visit local employers and heritage sites. We also organise guided tours in areas we operate from and seminars on the National Health Service, local government and the education and legal systems to help people settle into life in the UK.

We have particular expertise in working with South Asian women and have even pioneered pre-departure training for those waiting to join their husbands in the UK. We are now helping Afghan and Ukrainian nationals to build a new life in England. And we bring together Pakistani-led charities, social enterprises and voluntary groups from across the UK to share best practice and advocate for their communities.

We have come a long way since 1990 but our commitment to improving the lives of disadvantaged ethnic minorities is as strong as ever.

A very special message



ctor, writer, producer, musician, and activist, Riz Ahmed has sent a personal video message to all the winners and highly commended candidates at this year's YAYAs.

Riz, who won the 2022 Academy Award for Best Live Action Short Film alongside director Aneil Karia for the short film The Long Goodbye - making him the first Muslim actor to win in this category - said he thought QED's achievement in creating the awards was "incredibly important."

"I was born in Wembley to a British Pakistani family who had moved here from Karachi in the 1970s and I was lucky enough to win a school scholarship which helped me to get to Oxford University," he said. "I eventually graduated with a degree in Politics, Philosophy and Economics - but I nearly dropped out because it was such an isolating atmosphere, a real culture shock.

"I hope and believe that we've moved on a great deal in the last 20 years or so but there's no doubt that background and culture still play a big part in how successful you are in your life and career.

"Young people of South Asian heritage - and especially those of Pakistani origin - still suffer disproportionally from low educational achievement, poor home backgrounds, fewer opportunities and prejudice.

"The YAYAs is a brilliant way to help address that imbalance - by highlighting the achievements of those who succeed despite the odds being stacked against them; by holding up shining examples of achievement by young South Asians that illustrate just what can be achieved."

Ahmed, who was also nominated for an Academy Award, Golden Globe Award and SAG Award for his lead performance in Amazon Prime Video's Sound of Metal, said the YAYAs' short-listed candidates showed some fabulous stories of achievement.

"Whether each of them wins the main trophy or not this evening, they are all role models, all brilliant achievers who have broken through barriers to progress and advancement that many others have been unable to surmount," he said. "I have been lucky enough to enjoy some success in my chosen career in film but I am truly humbled by what these awards winners have done."

Riz won the National Board of Review, IFP Gotham Award and Film Independent Spirit Award for Best Actor, as well as more than fourteen leading critics groups.

He was named British/Irish Actor of the Year at the London Critics' Circle 2020 Awards for his work in Sound of Metal and Mogul Mowgli.

He became one of Hollywood's most sought-after artists following the explosive success of HBO's The Night Of (written and created by the legendary Steven Zaillan), for which he won an Emmy Award, and was Golden Globe and SAG Award nominated.

Previously, Ahmed starred in successful feature films including Disney's Rogue One: A Star Wars Story, Jacques Audiard's The Sisters Brothers and Sony/Marvel's Venom. He first won industry attention in festival favourites Four Lions and Nightcrawler.

uma Malik's virtual volunteering during the dark days of the Covid-19 pandemic contributed significantly to her success in last year's Yorkshire Asian Young Achievers awards.

"It felt surreal - but it was so lovely to just be recognised, not that it feels like I have done anything extra special," says Huma humbly.

Despite her long-term health conditions - Huma attends regular hospital appointments for blood transfusions and treatments - she somehow finds time to volunteer and one of her roles was volunteering virtually during the pandemic with Leaders Unlocked, promoting the voice of young people in health and mental health.

Huma believes the award came at a particularly poignant time when people like her, who suffer with health issues, were still feeling vulnerable following the pandemic, despite normality having returned for many people.

"To have that little bit of recognition and, at the same time, it is supporting others, talking to them about medical conditions and the pandemic, how it can have an impact - that has been really important as well," says Huma. "It is about a society that is still getting back to normal when most of society

is already back to normal, and it is helping to bridge that gap - being able to have a platform makes a bit of a link with others."

Huma is particularly focused on young people's mental health. Through her work with Leaders Unlocked, she became involved with the Mental Health Foundation, and was appointed a trustee of the charity in March.

She has also worked for the charity Barnardo's, delivering wellness recovery action planning groups to support young people with their mental health. She also runs the social enterprise, Music Talkz, providing workshops tackling mental health amongst young people.

Huma explains how Music Talkz developed from her own love of music and tapping into its benefits for her own mental health. Sessions are currently run online, although she says she hopes to deliver them face to face in future.

"It was set up in 2017 and it supports

young people's mental health
through creative tools; lyric
writing, workshops," Huma
explains. "Music Talkz taps
into the natural synergy
between mood and music.
It has been my tool within
supporting my mental
health and, working
for Barnardo's, I
realised it was
something young
people were
using," says
Huma.

"It also highlights how everybody uses music on a daily basis to regulate their mood and emotions. It is something we are always using but may not be consciously aware of it."

Huma believes that, in the aftermath of the pandemic, more young people need mental health support than before, but acknowledges that it is being widely recognised: "I think young people, for the first time in a very long time, are getting that awareness with mental health. I think there is more awareness and I think the pandemic has just highlighted a lot of things for young people."

Now she is hoping, through her own achievements, she can encourage others to strive for success and overcome issues in their lives.

She says achieving the Yorkshire Asian Young Achiever Award has enabled her to profile the work she is doing, supporting others.

Since winning the award Huma has become a trustee of the Mental Health Foundation, and is making positive progress within her professional career working as an engagement officer for NHS Leeds CCG to support patient voice in service change.

She says her family, friends and work colleagues were all really proud of her award: "They were absolutely over the moon and really supportive."

Since setting up QED in 1990, he has served on numerous public, private and voluntary sector boards and committees, including for the NHS, the Home Office, DWP, IOD, EU, ACEVO, the University of Bradford and York St John University. He was awarded the OBE in 2001.

Adeeba Malik is the Deputy Chief Executive of QED. Born in Bradford to immigrant parents, she has been with the organisation for 28 years. Previously she was a teacher in Hull and Bradford. She has held numerous roles on various boards in Bradford, Yorkshire, and nationally, including Yorkshire Forward, Northern Ballet, and the Women and Work Commission. Jo Quinton-Tulloch became the director of the National Science and Media Museum in 2013. Her 23 years in museums started in the Learning Team at the Science Museum. She has delivered world class galleries and exhibitions, including as part of the team that created and launched the National Maritime Museum Cornwall. Jo's focus in Bradford has been to forge new sustainable partnerships which reposition the Museum as a STEM learning centre of excellence. Jo led a major relaunch of the renamed and rebranded NSMM in 2017. She is a Fellow of the Royal Society for the Arts.

THE SPEAKERS

TRACEY BRABIN, MAYOR OF WEST YORKSHIRE

Tracy Brabin is a British Labour and Co-operative politician who was elected as the first Mayor of West Yorkshire, and the first ever woman Metro Mayor in England, in May 2021. During her campaign, Tracy pledged to create 1,000 skilled jobs for young people, lead a 'Creative New Deal' for the region, bring buses back under public control, tackle the climate emergency and build 5,000 affordable and sustainable homes. As Mayor, Tracy also inherits the roles and responsibilities of the former Police and Crime Commissioner. Her priorities for policing include to recruit more frontline officers and staff and to prioritise the safety of women and girls. Prior to her election as Mayor, Tracy was the Member of Parliament for Batley and Spen from 2016 until 2021.

As MP, she held appointments as Shadow Early Years Minister, Shadow Secretary of State for Digital,

Culture, Media and Sport, and Shadow Minister for Cultural Industries. Moreover, Tracy is a former member of the Women and Equalities Select Committee and a former chair of the Gaps in Support All-Party Parliamentary Group, having led the campaign on behalf of the three million people excluded from Government financial support during the COVID-19 pandemic. Born in Batley, Tracy was an actor and screenwriter prior to entering politics, appearing in several British soaps.

PROFESSOR KAREN BRYAN OBE. VICE-CHANCELLOR. YORK ST JOHN UNIVERSITY

Professor Karen Bryan joined York St John University as Vice Chancellor in April 2020. She was previously Deputy V-C (Academic) at the University of Greenwich. Prior to that she was Pro Vice Chancellor for Regional Engagement and Dean of the Faculty of Health and Wellbeing at Sheffield Hallam University. Professor Bryan qualified as a speech and language therapist from the University of Newcastle upon Tyne and also gained her PhD there. Her research interests are in communication difficulties in young offenders and in forensic populations, also the impact of communication difficulties on access to healthcare. She is involved in the development of Registered Intermediaries working for the Ministry of Justice, and was previously a member of the Health Professions Council.Professor Bryan is a Visiting Professor in the Department of Neuropsychology at the University of Warsaw, and is a Fellow of the Royal College of Speech and Language Therapists. She was awarded an OBE for services to higher education in 2018.

Dr Mohammed Ali OBE is Founder and CEO of QED Foundation. He has worked in ethnic minority community development for over 35 years, in the UK and Europe. He is a social entrepreneur, pioneering and developing new ways of addressing the social and economic challenges facing ethnic minority communities. He worked with Glaxo Pharmaceuticals, Bradford Community Relations Council, Tameside Council, Sheffield City Council and Fullemploy, a London-based ethnic minority social and economic development agency, before setting up QED in 1990. He has served on numerous public, private and voluntary sector boards and committees, including for the NHS, Home Office, DWP, IOD, EU, ACEVO, Bradford University and York St John University. He is chair of the Poverty Alleviation Scholarships Foundation and the Network of Pakistani Voluntary Organisations

(UK). He has won many accolades for his work including an honorary doctorate from Bradford University in 1997 and the OBE in 2001.

KERSTEN ENGLAND CBE. CEO. CITY OF BRADFORD METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Kersten has been Chief Executive of Bradford Council since 2015. Her main priority is to deliver sustainable and inclusive growth. Kersten chairs the Yorkshire and Humber Chief Executive's Board, the Serious and Organised Crime Strategic Partnership for West Yorkshire, the Bradford and Tower Hamlets 'Act Early' Partnership, is the lead Chief Executive for the Yorkshire Leaders Board and an advisor to the Resolution Foundation. She leads on innovation, business growth and the digital agenda within the West Yorkshire Combined Authority. Kersten is a trustee of the Young Foundation. She is also a member of the Council of the University of Bradford, a member of the advisory board of the Bradford Literature Festival and a lay canon of Bradford Cathedral. Kersten was made a CBE in the 2020 new year's honours list.








reduce offending and anti-social behaviour.

Bradford's Bilal Akhtar, 29, opened his burger place during Covid despite many challenges. It now employs 8 young people. He has worked since 15, including in banking, and achieved a 2:1 Degree in Physical Education. In 2019, Bilal was jailed for driving dangerously and, determined to change his life, set up Bvrgry. He has raised money for charity and is keen to be a role model for young Asian boys helping them to leave lives of crime.



YEASIN MOHAMMED

Owner of the Sizzling Lounge restaurant, in Bingley, Yeasin Mohammed, of Bradford, was born in Burma/Myanmar. After staying in a Bangladeshi refugee camp, he came to England in 2010 as a refugee asylum seeker through United Nations. Undeterred, despite his lack of English, Yeasin succeeded. Aged 24, he owns a 100-seater restaurant in Bingley. He is an award-winning bodybuilder and also cares for his mum.

Muhammad, of Bradford, overcame his shyness to tackle prejudice and discrimination. His disability, in terms of his height and growth, has posed challenges, along with the loss of his mum, for whom he was the main carer before her death in 2016.

Software developer Neil was determined to succeed, despite his disability. Neil, of Leicester, who works at Next Ltd, has Cerebral Palsy and is a wheelchair user.
